An Overview

St Cuthbert's Primary School is a friendly and welcoming school situated on the southern outskirts of Brunton. The school was originally situated in Brunton town centre but in 1997 moved to new purpose built premises close to the River Warley and Brunton Country Park. It has excellent transport links.

The school has 140 pupils on roll from Reception to Year 6. Plans to build a Nursery have had to be postponed until sufficient funding can be sourced but hopefully this will take place in 2018.

The school boasts excellent facilities, an I.T. suite, a modern, well-stocked library, a stage and auditorium for performances and assemblies and extensive playing fields. There are plans to build an indoor swimming pool in 2019 for shared community use.

Mrs Georgina Revell was appointed head teacher in 2012 when she took over from Mr Roger Burnett who had led the school for over thirty years. Mrs Revell has built a highly-committed and enthusiastic teaching staff and an excellent team of support staff who contribute enormously to the smooth running of the school and the wellbeing of all the pupils.

Results at both Key stages have seen steady and pleasing progress though there is always room for more improvement. Mrs Revell has set important targets which she aims to achieve with the help of the staff.

- Melanie Sands and Agnieszka Pawliszczke represented the school at the County cross country running championships.
- Nathan Hope, Claire Norton and Connor Cole have been chosen to represent Brunton in the county Gymnastics competition.
- A team of Year 5 and Year 6 boys and girls reached the final of the local hockey tournament.
- Danius Ziloniene regularly plays clarinet in the county youth orchestra.
- Jacek Romanska has been chosen to represent the county in a chess championship in April in Leeds.
