Changing Holiday Habits (non-fiction),

Over the course of the last forty years, there has been an enormous change in the way that British families take their annual holidays. Up to the 1970s most families would holiday at the British coast in traditional seaside towns. It would be common and usual for extended families to go away for at least a week and stay in a caravan, a tent or small boarding house or hotel. Days would traditionally be spent on the beach, digging sandcastles, paddling or playing games such as cricket with other families. In the evenings, families would often entertain themselves playing board games or cards.

Although there were advantages to this kind of holiday, British weather can be unpredictable in the summer. So when it became much cheaper to fly abroad, families started to take 'package' holidays to places like Spain and Greece where the weather was almost guaranteed to be better.

Sadly nowadays, British seaside towns are much quieter and struggle to compete with the attraction of continental holidays. Family holidays today don't tend to include grand parents or uncles and aunts and this might be seen as a sad development.

Destination Disappointment


