

1.	Enlarge planning sheet to A3 and photocopy (enough for 1 between 2). I have also included a blank planning sheet to give teachers/children the option of inserting their own headings.	 Notes It is assumed that the teacher will have familiarised the children with the subject of reindeer and the features of a non
2.	Photocopy fact sheets 1 and 2 (enough for 1 between 2). Cut out each set of facts and place in envelopes. For this particular activity, I have also included some "fun facts" and pictures based around Santa's reindeer. The use of these is entirely optional but I find that they provide an extra element of Christmas fun as well an opening for discussion opportunities relating to fact and fiction.	chronological report prior to engaging in this activity.
3.	Give each pair of children an envelope and a planning sheet and discuss subheadings.	• Suggested differentiation:
4.	Children sort facts into different sections on the planning sheet (point out that the facts have largely been written in note form). This part of your lesson provides an excellent op- portunity to discuss paragraphing.	LA: include at least 2 facts under each subheading and 1 amazing fact.
5.	The images provided can be used to support some of the facts.	
6.	After sorting the facts into the different groups, children can stick them onto their planning sheet.	MA: include at least 4 facts under each subheading and 1 amazing fact.
7.	Using the report writing frame provided, teacher discuss/ demonstrate how to use the notes to create sentences.	
8.	Give each child a report writing frame on which to draft their report (I enlarge mine to A3).	HA: include more than 4 facts under each subheading and 1 amazing fact.

Fact sheet 1

males and females grow antlers	thick, double layered coats to keep them warm
can be found in northern parts of Europe, North America and Asia	sense of sight and hearing not good - mainly rely on sense of smell
males usually bigger and heavier than females	herd animals - live in groups
antlers are like fingerprints - no two are the same.	can run fast - between 36 and 48 mph (much faster than Usain Bolt)
plant eaters (herbivores)	large cloven (split into 2) hooves - good for walking on soft ground
males are called bucks, females are called does, babies are called fawns	grey-brown fur - darker in summer and lighter in winter
live for up to 15 years	shed their antlers every year and new ones grow

Fact sheet 2

babies (calves) can run within a few hours of being born	after they shed their antlers, smaller animals and rodents eat them
reindeer predators include grey wolves, grizzly bears, brown bears, wolverines and golden eagles	polar bears don't usually hunt reindeer because they cannot catch them
the only mammal with eyes that change colour - in the summer, eyes look golden brown and in the winter they look blue	reindeer's milk has more fat than cow's milk to help calves grow big and strong
calves stay with mothers for up to two years	calves antlers start to grow 2 months after birth
live in herds for protection against predators - predators have more chance of attacking one reindeer than a large group of reindeer	Some can make clicking noises as they walk to communicate with other members of a herd during bad weather or blizzards
move around a lot - have been known to cover up to 3000 miles in a year	use hooves to dig holes in snow to find food in winter
eat sedges (grass like plants that grow in clumps), grasses, herbs, ferns and mosses in summer	eat lichens and fungi in winter
