Common Nouns and Proper Nouns

A noun is a word for a person, a place or a thing.

Names of things are common nouns.

They DO NOT begin with a capital letter. Example: clock

Names of people are proper nouns.

Proper nouns ALWAYS begin with a capital letter. Example: Mr. Jones

It is your job to write the nouns in the box underneath each picture. You will need to decide whether you are writing a common noun or a proper noun. Remember! Proper nouns start with capital letters.


More than One


Plural means more than one.

Doing words are called verbs.


