## Common Nouns and Proper Nouns

A noun is a word for a person, a place or a thing.
Names of things are common nouns.
They DO NOT begin with a capital letter. Example: clock
Names of people, characters and places are proper nouns.
Proper nouns ALWAYS begin with a capital letter. Example: Mr. Jones

## Better than Said

## Commas are Cool!

Commas are used to separate items in a list.
Sometimes these items are objects.
Example: I'm going to buy some bread, butter, cheese and milk.

Sometimes these items are places you go or things that you do.
Example:
On Saturday I played football, rode my bicycle and went to the park.
ALWAYS use and to separate the last two items in your list and make sure you DO NOT use a comma before and at the end of your list.
